3. Chair's Annual Report

I am pleased to report that we have had another good year.

In terms of events, our biggest annual event is always the Christmas season and the Light Switch On, with the associated chapel service at Eton College. Last year was no exception with an excellent event, run by Karen and Stephen, with Paul Roach from RBWM and La talking to us in Chapel. This year had more stalls than ever and Charlie's traditional swing boats too. Basil Brush switched on the lights for us, facilitated by Ieva, who made costumes for Basil and his friends, as you will know from Eton Matters!

We have just enjoyed the Street party to celebrate the Royal Wedding and we had lots of fun. Thanks go to so many helpers, particularly the organising group of Christine, Stewart, Philip and Lynne Highy from EWVA (and me)! We added a Souvenir Programme this time; please take one if you wish.

We have championed several other events again this year. Highlights in the year include:

- Three excellent talks at the Natural History museum; one by the Police, one about animals

- and birds in the snow and another about spiders
- Another great pub quiz at the Crown and Cushion, following last year's successful one
- A walk to Dorney and back, with both routes introducing the intrepid walkers to new paths
- Two more Open Shop events, at Ileva's and at Malcolm's
Thanks to especially to Katie and to Noorzaman and others too, not least the location hosts.

As in previous years, we have both led and supported very many enhancements in our local environment, with great support from our RBWM Councillor Malcolm A, Paul Roach and the Eton Town Council Mayor, Derek and our Town Clerk, Bob Austen. But there is always more to do. This year, we started the year with installation of the Waterman's bench and then moved on to cycle parking. The additional hoops at 61 High Street, outside the Waterman's and outside the Christopher Wren allowed us to remove those that were obscuring the Wendy Ramshaw OBE bollards. Soon after that, the paving enhancements, gulley replacements and road surface improvements started. The lights, including the change to LEDs with the associated sustainability and cost benefits started (and are nearly complete) and very significantly, the heritage lamps on both bridges are now refurbished and looking as they should, at last.

We again reinforced the importance of the pollution measurement at Keates Lane junction, having stopped the proposal to move the measurement point up towards Keates House/South Meadow Lane. In fact, the like-with-like pollution measurements are marginally improved for a second consecutive year, although still at the "borderline acceptable" level vs. European legislation.

We worked with ETC to support the Spring Clean national initiative and had excellent support from College again and from our Mayor. 38 attendees; 45 rubbish sacks!

Eton Matters is regarded as a real highlight when it drops through the letter boxes of every resident, retailer and business in Eton and is circulated on College's intranet. Thanks go to our Editor, Peter Eaton, and to those who advertise which is critical to cover our costs – and to those who pen such an interesting range of articles. The number of people who say "Wow, I didn't know that!" about Eton locations, history or facts. Do have a look at the article by one of our Town Councillors, Michael Cadwallader. He and MonaLiza have written such a great piece about the former "Michael's Bakery".

Talking about communications, huge thanks go to Russell, who week after week turns our Eton information into a great little "Shout Out", which reaches more than 400 people, who are signed up to the website. (Incidentally, we have ensured that we are compliant with GDPR and our database is registered with the ICO.) We are pretty strict about only Eton and Eton Wick events, with no advertising nor favouritism to any particular part of our community.

The Eton Walkway deserves a quick mention. The launch plaque is now in place and we may still have an official opening.....which may be a Royal one. Footfall in Eton has increased at a time when footfall in most other parts of the country is dropping. We always said that we would augment the Eton Walkway with an Information Centre, if funds allowed us to at least make a start. We are delighted to say that the former Eton Wine Shop will become the Eton Information Centre, thanks to College supporting us through a rent-free period of 3 years! We now have great support from RBWM and will be linked to the Windsor Information centre. This has many upsides but has slowed progress somewhat

Finally, Restoring the Brook has started! Led by Peter Eaton and with a local team including Derek, George, Philip Tilbury and me, we are recreating Eton. Eyot-Ton tells us all that this was an island town...and our aim is to Restore the brook, which is culverted for the initial 480meters and final length, but which has a brook with potential for flora, fauna and biodiversity and Barnes Pool, which can flow again as was the case historically.

We have also been able to support various charities and good causes, including Alexander Devine, Eton Porny School and Eton pre-school.

Going forward: We have a walk and a Jack the Ripper talk planned (thank you, Katie). Thanks to College folk, we will visit the exceptional art in the Catholic Church...and Christmas will be in Mid-November as usual (on 15th November)!!

8. Update from Police Sergeant Emma Pendry

- I. Lizzie will soon restart monitoring cyclists, now that the Royal Wedding is done.
- II. Homeless issue has come full circle. The strategy hasn't worked as well as hoped, despite getting many into housing at the time of the last push. Some are engaging, some are not. The current focus is on two particular people. There is a plan for dealing with the aggressive beggar using a Criminal Behaviour Order, and there are also plans to support the other person. Mostly, arresting beggars doesn't solve the problem. Also public feeling is to support rather than penalise them. LO has reported problems a number of times. These will be logged and can be used as part of the process in managing beggars, for their own and the community's sake.
- III. RR thanks the police for the Royal Wedding, which felt very safe and very secure.
- IV. ANPR is in and working. There were additional cameras for the Royal Wedding. Some will be removed but some will stay. These are being really successful.
